Making unleavened bread in Sunday school



It's timely, really, that I was asked to write this reflection. I have been doing a lot of just that, reflecting on a season of struggle that has left me forever changed.

The Bible is full of suffering. I have often found comfort in the Psalms, reading the words of the psalmists asking for help during times of great struggle and heartache. Even Jesus himself cried out to God in the Garden of Gethsemane, "he fell with his face to the ground and prayed, My Father, if it is possible, may this cup be taken from me." Matthew 26:39

n July of 2022, I began experiencing a slew of health issues, the most persistent being daily, unexplained dizziness. After an exhausting year and a half of doctor's appointments, running tests, seeing specialists, and following specific diets with no relief, I stopped trying to figure it out. Instead, I opened my control-hungry hands and released it to the Lord. I was quite literally taken to my knees, needing God more than ever before.

ere I sit on the other side of suffering, healed and healthy, and I have felt a real pull to reflect on that season of my life - to mark it in some significant way. While I am of course relieved to see that chapter pass, a part of me wants to hold on to

it. I never want to forget how, in the depths of fear and suffering, God was there. He heard my cries, he gave me hope, and he ignited a deep faith that had laid dormant for years. Suddenly, a weekly bible study was on my calendar and a small prayer group had formed. My days began with quiet times and ended with prayer - lots of it. I found myself, finally, in church. I sat in nearly every pew in Richmond looking for a place that felt right. One summer Sunday morning, leaving St. Mary's, I knew the search was over. It felt familiar and easy, and laid back in all the best ways. Out of desperation, I turned to God, and though healing took time, the blessings that came while waiting healed me in ways I hadn't even known to ask for.

hat I have found while reflecting on perhaps the most challenging chapter of my life is the abundant blessings that are woven into the hardest seasons. It is there, on your knees, that the Lord reveals himself in ways you may miss during the day-to-day coasting of uncomplicated life. Suffering changes us, it stays with us. Even Jesus still wears wounds on his hands.

t's hard to believe I would ever be thankful for a time I prayed desperately to end, but I am, believe it or not, grateful for the suffering. For the places and people it led me to, for how it forever shaped my faith, and for how it will impact every chapter to come. Seasons change, suffering ends, but the blessings knit throughout the struggle remain. May this be a reminder that whatever you are going through, he hears you, he is working, and this won't last forever. The blessings, however - they will.
